DAILY JOURNAL

Some people might call writing your daily thoughts or activities a diary while others prefer to call it a journal. I personally like the idea of journal. In the business of ranching sometimes we don't think we need to write or type anything down because cattle can't read. While it is very evident that cattle can't read, managers should be able to read. I know for a fact that as I get older my memory is not as good as it was a few years ago. So one of the things I try to do is write or type what happened especially on important occasions. We can't manage what we don't measure. In other words, if something was important enough to measure we probably need to write it down. For example rainfall amounts per day. Most managers measure how much rainfall they get then total the amounts at the end of the year to know what they actually received.

Another good habit to adopt is writing a monthly summary of major events. This is where your daily journal entries may come in handy. You can go back and summarize the things that were important on a daily basis into a monthly report. You can then email the monthly reports to your owners or family members to help to keep them informed of what is happening on the ranch. Communication is the key to success. So the better informed we are and the better we communicate the more successful we become. A daily journal and monthly reports are two things most employers are requesting more and more; even if your aren't, this may be a way that can help you better communicate and be more successful. Try it, you might like it.
